


## Diaspora Watchlist Expands

Security sources revealed that an expanded watchlist has been compiled, targeting individuals across the globe believed to be orchestrating anti-government campaigns.

This includes Zimbabwean citizens residing in Canada, the United States, South Africa, the United Kingdom, China, Ireland, and Australia, among others.

Many of these individuals are said to be members of WhatsApp groups, Facebook pages, X (formerly Twitter) accounts, and underground human rights and political movements linked to opposition factions and exiled activists.

A partial list seen by our publication includes the following names: Blessed Runesu Geza (Bombshell), Wellington Masiwa (Nyokayemabhunu), Melody Phylis Magejo, Wadzanai Muredzi, Shamiso Moyo, Themba Gorimbo, Rumbidzai Moyo, Nolanga Evangelista Ndlovu, Mellissa Tonderai Tagarira, Shepherd Yuda, Mollin Muteto, and Petty Ziramba.

The Office of the President and Cabinet (OPC) recently issued warnings against those who mobilise foreign sanctions, campaign against national initiatives, or interfere with official State visits through protest or online agitation. This comes after diaspora-based activists reportedly submitted petitions to US officials urging them to cancel cultural and diplomatic visits by Zimbabwean nationals deemed aligned to Zanu PF.
